This includes a dedicated Tamil-speaking mental health therapist who exclusively addresses and supports mental health within the Tamil community and a fulltime Tamil interpreter available to support patients and families.

Music is a Powerful Device to Navigate Grief

The last few months have had me traveling along the journey of grief. I recently lost my dad, Kanapathipillai Thirukumaran, on June 16, 2023. He was also the cofounder of the Monsoon Journal, as mentioned in last month's issue of the paper. It has been a struggle, where I often feel a strong sense of vulnerability as I try to continue going forward in life. My ongoing experience with grief is also compounded by the fact that I lost my mom, Nalene Thirukumaran, a few years ago on October 16, 2020. Sadness seems to have sat with me in both covert and overt ways as I go about my days due to the heaviness that this kind of loss has on someone who has not even approached their 30s. However, I find that one way that I have been able to process and channel feelings of grief is through music. In that sense, I hope this publisher's desk can serve other readers out there who may also be dealing with grief.

Music has had this powerful effect of releasing feelings of sadness and love for my parents. Water easily collects around my eye ducts, flowing down my cheeks, upon simply listening to devotional Tamil songs. Bhaja Govindam is one particular song that evokes a strong emotional experience since it was one of my dad's favorite songs. I would say that music is a device that allow someone to express or touch their realest self that can be non-describable through words or speech. There are now moments at home where I just desire to browse and listen to songs found on Spotify playlists, and even sing along, especially R&B as well as soul tunes. It really gives someone in mourning the capacity to heal during their journey of grief. The meaning behind the lyrics as well as the melodies from these songs unleash the emotion of living life and all the experiences accompanying it.

On the other hand, the vulnerability that grief places you in can also bring up feelings of doubt, negativity, or worry. It's important to recognize whether those periods of vulnerability are signs of self-doubt or grief, as I try to do each day. I find that music does help—us see that as well. It encourages us to look inward to see the pain or hardships that we may have internalized from our own life experiences beyond grief.

While the rawness of these emotions that are released can be a tiring process, listening to music gives way for you to redirect and manage those feelings that are bubbling towards the surface. It grants you a key to unlock the deeper thoughts, memories, and emotions that are located within yourself. According to Pathways Home Health, music can help create your story, redefine your relationship with grief and even transform it into a thing of beauty. From my experience, this can lead us from listening to creating music. Hip Hop music particularly has become a device for me in creating that story. My own interest in it has even led me to just rap as a pastime to attend to my wellbeing as I deal with grief. However, those who may not be as interested in rap or hip-hop music can find other ways to be creative musically or in other fields to help with grief. Also, it really is not about the skills or

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talent, but more so about the bravery of engaging yourself in that creative act. To give those raw emotions an outlet of expression.

Music has become a great form of therapy for me during these times. Music therapy is something that I have been unintentionally practicing. Yet, it is by writing this publisher's desk that I am now more conscious of this activity. Through this practice, I am able to feel fully the truly dynamic nature of our emotions because music can navigate us through the wild nature of grief.

Indian Rescuers Working to Free 40 Men Trapped in Collapsed Tunnel

Rescuers on Tuesday continued battling to save 40 Indian construction workers who have been trapped inside part of a Himalayan highway tunnel that collapsed early Sunday.

The rescue team has been drilling a hole through debris in hopes to affix a wide steel pipe that can be used to pull the workers to

Authorities have said the men, trapped men for some 60 hours, are safe and healthy, and have been given food, water and oxygen, and have been in regular contact with the rescue

The early Sunday collapse occurred with about 50-60 workers inside. Those who were near the exit were able to escape, with 40 remaining in the tunnel.

The workers are expected to be freed by Tuesday night or Wednesday according to senior government official Ranjit Sinha.

The 4.5-kilomenter tunnel, which had been under construction since 2018, is in Uttarakhand state, a mountainous region known for its many Hindu temples that attract pilgrims and visitors. The tunnel was a part of a new Char Dham Hindu pilgrimage route being built to connect the popular sights.

An ambitious government project, the improved highway route was expected to be completed in July 2022 at a cost of some \$1.5 billion, although completion is now delayed until at least 2024.

The region is prone to landslides, earthquakes and floods and the incident follows events of land subsidence that geologists, residents and officials have blamed on rapid construction in the mountains.

Many have long protested the construction along the highway, pointing to safety concerns and effects on the environment.

The federal government has said it is using environmentally sound construction techniques to ensure the safety of geologically unstable stretches.

Sri Lankan President Wickremesinghe presents budget;

says economy not out of crisis yet

Cost of living allowances for 1.3 million state employees and pensioners to be raised

🗬ri Lankan President Ranil Wickremesinghe on Monday presented his government's 2024 budget, emphasising the need for tough reforms until the full recovery of the cash-strapped island nation's economy.

Although Sri Lanka has managed to control its hyperinflation in the ongoing economic crisis, its economy was far from being fully recovered.

"We have been able to put back on the rails the derailed economy. Still, people undergo suffering,' Wickremesinghe, who is also the Finance Minister, said.

"The inflation which was 70 per cent in September 2022 has been reduced to 1.5 per cent in October this year," the minister said.

He said in order for the island nation to prevent another bankruptcy, hard reforms are a

The state banks were made to fund the losses of state enterprises. He proposed that two



the public and investors while the government would inject cash into the state banks to maintain their stability.

Wickremesinghe said the costof-living allowances for 1.3 million state employees and pensioners numbering 7,00,000 would be raised by Rs 10,000 and Rs 3,000, respectively, from 2024.

The announcement came as state employees last week held hike of Rs 20,000.

He said the government could no longer print money or get external borrowings for state expenditure.

Wickremesinghe blamed the political trade union for protests against investment projects such as the Trincomalee Oil Tanks Farm Deal with India.

A special presidential task force would see the development of the entire Trincomalee district, he

said. Highlighting the revenue shortfall, Wickremesinghe said there remains a monthly state expenditure deficit of Rs 168 billion with the government having to pay Rs 220 billion as loan interest.

The revenue shortfall was one of the key factors mentioned in the International Monetary Fund's (IMF) first review of its 2.9-billiondollar bailout.

The budget speech made no reference to when the second tranche of the IMF four-year bailout would be forthcoming.

Wickremesinghe said this budget was not a 2024 election budget as no popular handouts were announced.

The next presidential election must be called by mid-September of 2024 and be held before the end of November.

Minister Ng advances cooperation on trade, investment and supply-chain resilience in the Asia-Pacific Region



This week, the Honourable Mary Ng, Minister of Export Promotion, International Trade and Economic Development, participated in the 2023 Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Annual Ministers' Meeting in San Francisco, California.

While at APEC, Minister Ng highlighted Canada's commitment to deepen its engagement across the Indo-Pacific by continuing to work closely with APEC economies to ensure strong, sustainable, and inclusive growth that creates good jobs and opportunities for businesses on both sides of the Pacific.

During a US-hosted session on economic prosperity and resiliency, Minister Ng underscored the importance of supporting a rules-based multilateral trading system with the WTO at its core. She encouraged APEC partners to work towards ambitious outcomes at the upcoming WTO 13th Ministerial Conference.

Minister Ng also discussed solutions to strengthen resilient global supply chains and build a green and sustainable future during a roundtable with key business leaders from Canada and San Francisco. She advanced discussions on trade and investment to support Canada's economic growth, including finding opportunities for Canadian businesses in key sectors including clean technology, critical minerals, and agricultural exports.

Minister Ng attended a Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP) Business Dialogue event where CPTPP members engaged with businesses from CPTPP economies, to get their perspective on the Agreement and ensure it is properly benefitting businesses. She also attended the CPTPP Ministers Breakfast, where members endorsed a Joint Ministerial Statement as well as the Terms of Reference for the CPTPP General Review, a process meant to assess and improve the implementation and effective functioning of the Agreement. As the 2024 CPTPP Commission Chair, Minister Ng took the opportunity to emphasize Canada's

commitment to ensuring the Agreement remains the most high-standard and ambitious trading platform in the region by proposing three priorities for the year ahead: ensuring this agreement reaches its full potential; leading with our values; and expanding our geopolitical influence.

On the margins of the APEC meeting, Minister Ng marked the launch of the Indigenous Peoples Economic and Trade Cooperation Arrangement (IPETCA) Partnership Council. The Council will facilitate cooperation among participating economies, with the objective of identifying and removing barriers for Indigenous Peoples' economic empowerment and participation in trade. Minister Ng also co-hosted, with her counterparts from the United States, Australian, New Zealand a panel discussion with Indigenous Peoples focused on improving engagement practices to increase Indigenous trade and economic empowerment in the APEC region and beyond. Both initiatives align with priorities under Canada's Indo-Pacific Strategy and advanced Canada's commitment to reconciliation. Canada will continue working closely with Indigenous Peoples and international partners to help Indigenous businesses start up, scale up, and acces new markets around the world.

In a series of bilateral meetings, Minister Ng spoke with Nguyen Hong Dien, Vietnam's Minister of Industry and Trade, Juan Carlos Mathews, Peru's Minister of Foreign Trade and Tourism, Tengku Zafrul Aziz, Malaysia's Minister of Investment, Trade and Industry, Senator Don Farrell, Australia's Minister for Trade, Tourism and Investment, Zulkifli Hasan, Indonesia's Minister of Trade, and John Deng, Chinese Taipei's Minister without Portfolio in charge of the Office of Trade Negotiations to advance collaboration on trade and investment.

Minister Ng wrapped up the week by participating in the APEC Leaders Summit alongside Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

Minister Hussen announces funding for **Canadian** Foodgrains Bank



Up to 783 million people in the world are facing hunger, and nearly 98% of them live in developing countries. The effects of climate change—diminishing water supplies and increased frequency of extreme events like floods, heat waves and storms—and world events like Russia's war against Ukraine exacerbate food insecurity. Canada remains committed to international efforts that support climate change adaptation and the fight against global hunger.

Today, the Honourable Ahmed Hussen, Minister of International Development, announced \$35.5 million in funding over the next 3 years to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank to support its project Nature-Positive Food Systems for Climate Change Adaptation. Minister Hussen made the announcement at the University of Manitoba's Glenlea Research Station alongside the Canadian Foodgrains Bank's Kenneth Kim, Board Chair, and Barbara Macdonald, International Programs Director.

The project, funded through the Partnering for Climate initiative, aims to improve low-carbon, climate-resilient economies in rural areas of Ethiopia, Kenya, Mozambique and Zimbabwe to enhance the well-being of communities and, particularly, women, girls and other marginalized groups.

It will use nature-based solutions coupled with landscape-level restoration to address food insecurity and increasing threats to livelihoods. It also aims to increase the ability of targeted landscapes to absorb biophysical shocks and stresses caused by the increasingly disruptive effects of climate change.

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

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

How Safe Is Air Travel ???

The recent numerous incidents in the aviation **⊥** industry make us wonder whether air travel is safe or not. The simple answer is "Yes" If you speak to any well-experienced pilots like, Hudson River Famous, Capt. Sully Sullenberger or anyone will echo this.

This has become a million-dollar question for regular air travelers. On my first ever visit to a flying club in 1972, the Motto I read on the walls of this club still lingers, "The Air Is More Safer Than Roads". It takes us to the big question: what went wrong over the decades? As air traffic increases so does the safety risk in the skies. For air travel to be safe numerous people put their hearts and minds, day in and day out, for the well-being of all the people who are enclosed in a tubing from the time it is airborne till it lands. Who are these people who ensure the safety of all air travelers? The safety begins at ground level, and significant roles are played by ground staff who don't physically fly the plane. My ex-colleague and Capt. G.A. Fernando, used to quote, when we were working in the Flight Operations at AirCeylon in 1972, "Blue We Fly The Desks and The Pilot Flies The Plane" which is true. The staff that prepares the weight and balance, traffic, cargo flight operations staff, mechanics, engineers, Air traffic controllers, cabin staff, and pilots. All these people play a significant role in the safety of air travel. The aviation industry is still the safest mode of transport from point A to B.

A Harvard University research study established that flying in Europe, the USA, Canada, and Australia is much safer than driving a car. The airlines that are at the high end of the risk factor are from developing countries, Asia, Africa, and Latin American countries. Even here the safety culture has improved a lot. Many ingredients go together to enhance safe air travel in the skies every second, every minute, and every hour. Air travel safety is ensured by regulators, like FAA, ICAO, and EASA, and by the manufacturers as well. Air

traffic controllers work round the clock to keep the air travel safe, with the help of pilots and navigational aids from the time an aircraft is airborne till it lands safely. Air Traffic Controllers, I would brand them As "Unsung Heroes" in this vibrant industry. I remember there were instances in the past where the cockpit crew had fallen asleep on 14-hour or longer flights, and ATC staff played a significant role in waking them up. In the US pilots should have a minimum of

1500 hours of flying to sit on the right-hand side of the cockpit to fly with commercial airlines. The aircraft manufacturers must ensure the safety of the aircraft. We had horrific airline crashes within the last 5 years because of the manufacturer's fault as in the case of Boeing 737



MAX--8 with its MCAS system. These crashes caused the Boeing company to lose its prime slot as the number one in the industry. Nowadays aircraft are built with modern engine technology, and with a load of backup systems to facilitate safe air travel. Commercial aviation has soared to great heights because of its high demand and stiff competition. The airline management tries to cut corners to enhance the profit margins and survival in this deregulated travel industry. Also, they compromise the safety of passengers and their comfort. This is an alarming situation in many developing country airlines. No country should operate their flights with substandard and shoddy maintenance to endanger the safety of air travel under any norms.

The IATA, International Air Transport Association, one of the regulatory bodies in air travel in its safety performance report for 2022

> aviation a promising trend in the rate of accidents, from 7 in 2021 to 5 in 2022. On the same token, the fatality risk declined to 0.11% from 0.23 %. This data projects a positive atmosphere for the safety of air travel. Even though the risk of flying is exceptionally low, it is not risk-free at all as recent events within this month, and in the last few years, have painted a different story. Around the middle of October 2023, an off-duty pilot

indicates for global

flying in the jump seat of an Alaska airline tried to shut the engines down by pulling the red fire suppression handle down, which was prevented in the nick of time by the Captain and copilot. If not, a major disaster would have unfolded. Last week at Bush Intercontinental Airport in Houston two aircraft collided on the runway when a light plane was trying to take off without ATC permission. Isn't this worrisome? Alaska airline pilots had to be alerted by the ATC to prevent another accident in the air again. This is every pilot's nightmare even if they do their



part with absolute perfection. In the US the pilot's fears every day grow when two planes get dangerously close to each other," Near midairs. Many years back, one of the pilots said, " Hell every week goes by, it is almost accepted as a common event" which may raise alarm bells. But captain Hank Duffy, the outspoken head of the Airline Pilots Association said years back, "Near mid-airs, runway incursions, delays ---every indicator in the system, that we are hanging by our fingernails" The skies in the US are congested since every minute an aircraft takes off, and at least 1000 aircrafts are in the sky every minute. This puts lots of pressure on the system especially on the ATC which is understaffed, lacks proper training, and air traffic controllers are stretched to their limits. The New York Times reported recently that Air Traffic Controllers in many facilities are doing overtime 10-hour shifts, six days a week. This scenario is too dangerous. President Ronald Reagan sacked all the ATC controllers who went on strike and compromised safety. The close calls in the sky are worrisome and I wonder what happens when the luck runs out? This became a



reality on August 31, 1986, when a DC-9 and a private Piper aircraft collided in mid-air killing a total of 82 people in Los Angeles.

Human factors play a major role in all these aircraft incidents, accidents, and incursions. FAA and EASA ensure the safety of Air Travel as "Monitors of the Aviation Industry"

Like to conclude by quoting former FAA Chief Donald Engen, once said "ANY Accidents When You Dig In Points Finger To Human Beings, Accidents Just Don't Happen --- They Are Caused"



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

Sleepy Jaffna is waking up. Evening events, which are not temple or religious, are pulling in big crowds. Urban events that are very different to Jaffna's traditional Kite and Bull Cart Racing festivals.

A few days ago I put up a post about this

"Scary House" event, which happened for 3 days ending on 12th November. I had thought it was something to do with Deepavali, but apparently not. More linked to the Halloween "scary" theme.

I happily went down to its location yesterday evening. It's not far from me on Navalar Road. I went at about 7pm, an hour after the start, expecting to easily wander in.

I left without entering, scared off by the length of the queue.

The venue was already full when I arrived, with the gate closed. It seemed people were only being admitted as people left.

Extremely well organised, with police officers managing the traffic and queue on the road. I was very impressed by what I saw

outside, having never got inside to be impressed there.

Out of curiosity I walked to the end of the queue. It was very orderly and tightly packed with good humoured patient people. Someone in the queue I knew estimated a 2 hour wait from the back.

Though I didn't have the patience to wait in the queue, I was very happy to see the overflowing crowd. Events like this, and the weekly Saturday Night Fever by HappyMarket, which itself draws on average 1,500 people every weekend, prove the opportunity for more shows in Jaffna





I asked my dad if I have ever made him cry in front of me before, because I don't remember ever seeing him cry. He said, "Once." He told me that when I was 3 years old, he laid out a pen, a dollar, and a toy of some sort in front of me. He wanted to see which one I would pick. I think that a lot of Chinese people do that... V.O. CHIDAMBARAM PILLAI, AN INDIAN FREEDOM FIGHTER

18 TH YEAR IN CIRCULATION

INTRODUCTION

Valliappan Olaganathan Chidambaram Pillai, popularly known as VOC was born on 5^{th} September, 1872 in Ottapidaram, Tuticorin District in Tamil Nadu to Olaganathan Pillai and Paramayee Ammal. He learnt Tamil from teacher, Veeraperumal Annavi and learnt English in the evenings from a Taluk Officer named Krishnan. When Krishnan was transferred, his father built a school with the help of the villagers and appointed Aramvalarthananatha Pillai from Ettayapuram as the English teacher. The school was run by Fr. Adamson, a Priest at Pudhiamuthur. At 14, he went to Thoothukudi to study at St. Xavier High Scholl and then to Hindu College High School in Tirunelveli. He worked as a Taluk Office Clerk for a short time before his father sent him to Tiruchirappalli to study Law. After passing his Pleadership (The name for lawyers at that time) exam in 1894 and returned to Ottapidaram to become a Pleader in 1895. In Chennai he met Ramakrishnananthar, a saint attached to Swami Vivekananda Ashram, who advised VOC to do something for the nation. Here he also met the Tamil poet Bharathiyar who shared his political ideology and the two became close friends.

INDUCTION INTO POLITICAL LIFE

In the 1890s and 1900s, India's Independence Movement coupled with the Swadeshi Movement, started by Bal Gangadhar Tilak and Lala Lajpat Roy of the Indian National Congress were at their peak. He was influenced by Bal Gangadhar Tilak and became his disciple in 1892. Along with Subramanya Siva and Subramanya Bharathi, he became a spokesperson for the cause in the then Madras Presidency. In 1905, Chidambaram formally entered politics, joining the Indian National Congress and taking a hardline stance following the partition of Bengal. He also presided at the Salem District Congress session.

INDIAN INDEPENDENCE **MOVEMENT ACTIONS**

After joining the Indian National



Congress, V.O. Chidambaram Pillai wholeheartedly immersed himself into Swadeshi work to secure independence for India.

Swadeshi Shipping Company

Part of the Swadeshi work for Chidambaram Pillai was to put an end to the monopoly of British Shipping to the coasts of the then Ceylon. Part of the movement, he established several institutions like Swadeshi Prachar Sabha, Dharmasanga Nesavu Salai, National Godown, The Madras Agro-Industrial Society Ltd., Desabimana Sangam and Indian-Owned Shipping Company, called The Swadeshi Shipping Company. With a capital of Ten lakhs of rupees made up of 40,000 shares of Rupees 25 per share, he started the



Swadeshi Shipping

Company to compete against the monopoly of the British India Steam Navigation Company. To start with the Swadeshi Shipping company leased ships from the Shawline Steamers Company. Under pressure from the British India Steam Navigation Company Shawline Steamers cancelled their lease to the

Swadeshi Shipping Company. So, the Swadeshi Shipping company leased a single large freighter from Sri Lanka. Realizing the need for the Swadeshi Shipping Company to own its own vessels, Chidambaram travelled around India selling shares in the company to raise the capital. He vowed: I will come back with ships. Otherwise, I will perish ithe sea. He managed to secure sufficient funds to purchaser the first ship, S.S. Galia for the company and shortly afterwards they were able to acquire the S.S. Lava from France. The British Steam Navigation Company tried to buy out Chidambaram but he refused the deal. The ships

commenced regular service between Tuticorin and Colombo in Sri Lanka, against the opposition from the British traders and the Imperial Government.

Coral Mill Strike

V.O. Chidambaram, on Feb. 23, 1908 gave a speech at Thootthukudi, encouraging the workers at the Coral Mill to protest against their low wages and harsh working conditions and after four days the workers went on a strike. Subramanya Siva joined Chidambaram to lead the strike. They also made sure that the strike was widely publicized. It quickly gained popular support. On March 6th Chidambaram met with the management with some (seas holidays. This settlement helped workers at other European companies get increased wages and better working conditions. Sri Aurobindo appreciated Chidambaram and Siva for their unequalled skill and courage with which they conducted their fight, in his Vande Maataram daily on March 13, 1908.

Arrest and imprisonment

Chidambaram's political involvement drew the attention of the British in 1908. Learning that Chidambaram was planning to speak at a rally celebrating the release of the Bengali leader Bipin Chandra Pal, Mr. Winch a British official invited him and his political comrade, Subramanya Siva to meet hm in Thirunelveli. The British officer expressed his concerns and requested them both not to take part in

any political revolt. Chidambaram refused to accept his conditions and so he and Subramanya Siva were arrested on March 12, 1908. The arrest met with widespread protest. In Thirunelveli, shops, schools and colleges were closed in protest and riot broke out. The municipal offices, post offices and police stations and municipal courts were attacked. Public meetings and processions were held and four people were killed by the police.


Though Chidambaram's supporters raised required funds for the bail, he refused to leave the jail without the release of Subramanya Siva and others. Subramanya Bharathi and Subramanya appeared in the court for questioning the case levelled against Chidambaram. He was charged under two sections under the Indian Penal Code for speaking against the British and giving shelter to other protesters. Chidambaram refused to take part in the proceedings. Chidambaram was charged with sedition and a sentence of two life imprisonments totaling to 40 years was imposed and was confined in the Central Prison in Coimbatore for almost 30 months. Both the popular local press and the British Statesman Magazine widely condemned the punishment calling it unjust. Chidambaram appealed the sentence in High Court and had the punishment reduced to 4 years imprisonment and 6 years in exile. An appeal to the Privy Council led to a further reduction in sentence.



Chidambaram was placed in Coimbatore and Kannanoor jails and was not treated neither as a political prisoner nor was the sentence a simple imprisonment. He was treated as a convict sentenced to life imprisonment and made to do hard labour, which caused his health to suffer considerable damage. The historian and a Tamil Scholar, R.A. Padmanabhan, made a reference in his works that Chidambaram was yoked (in place of bull) to the oil press (sekku), like an animal and made to work it in the cruel hot sun..." From prison, Chidambaram continued correspondence, maintaining a steady stream of legal petitions. He was finally released on December 12, 1912. To his dismay, the Swadeshi Steam Navigation Company he had started had already been liquidated in 1911 and the ships auctioned to their competitors.

LIFE AFTER PRISON

After he was released from the prison, his law license was stripped and so, he moved with his wife and two young sons moved to Chennai, where he started provision store and a kerosene store. Chidambaram withdrew from the Indian National



Congress in 1920, citing ideological differences with Mahatma Gandhi. He started focusing his efforts on establishing Labour unions in Madras and doing some writing. After moving to Coimbatore, he worked as a bank manager. Dissatisfied with the income, he petitioned the court seeking permission to practice law again. Judge, E.H. Wallace gave permission to restore his pleadership license. To show his gratitude to the Judge, Chidambaram named his last son, Valacewaran. He rejoined the Indian National Congress only to severe his contacts once and for all.

HIS LITERARY WORKS

In 1932 he moved to Thootthukudi, where he spent all his time writing and publishing books in Tamil.

His written works include:

- 1. Meyyaram 1914,
- 2. Meyyarivu 1915,
- 3. Anthology 1915,
- 4. Autobiography 1946 and besides these he wrote articles to many magazines and translated few works and wrote literary notes to Thirukkural.

He also published couple of his works: Thirukkural with literary notes of Manakundavar in 1917 and Tolkoppiam with literary notes of Ilampooranar in 1928.

POSTHUMOUS HONOURS

- 1. M.P. Sivagnanam, popularly known as Ma.Po.Si., wrote a biography of V.O. Chidambaram and named it: Kappalottiya Tamizhan (the Tamizhan who drove the ship)
- 2. He was called *Chekkiluththa* **Chemmal** (a great man who pulled

- the oil press in jail for the sake of his people).
- 3. The Indian Post & Telegraphs Department of India issued a special 20 Paisa postage stamp on the 5th of September, 1972, on the occasion of his birth centenary.
- 4. There were statues of V.O. Chidambaram commissioned at various locations and the notable few are:
 - a. At the entrance of the Congress Committee Office in Roya pettah, Chennai (1939)
 - b. At the arch of Palayamkottai, Thirunelveli,
 - c. At the Marina Beach in Chennai, unveiled at the time of the World Tamil Conference
 - d. At the port in Thoothukudi and it was unveiled by the then Prime Minister, Indira Gandhi
 - e. At Simmakkal, Madurai, unveiled by the then Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, M'G. Ramachandran
 - f. At the Commemorative building of V.O.C. in Thirunelveli, unveiled by the then Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, Miss. Jayalaitha and
 - The Tuticorin Port was rechristened as V.O. Chidambaram Port Trust, by the then Prime-Minister, Dr. Manmohan Singh and Thiru G.K. Vasan, Union Minister for Shipping.

The Prime Minister, Sri Narendra Modi paid tribute to the freedom fighter, V.O. Chidambaram Pillai on his birth Anniversary. He said, "Our nation is indebted to the great V.O. Chidambaram Pillai to the freedom struggle. He also placed great emphasis on economic progress and becoming self-reliant. His ideals continue to inspire us all".





First Tamil Canadian to be recognized for Canada's Women's History Month 2023



Dr. Ratnam recognized by WAGE Canada for her contribution to gender equality in the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) sector.

In October 2023, Woman and **▲**Gender Equality (WAGE) Canada recognized Dr. Ratnam as part of Women's History Month, an annual celebration highlighting the outstanding achievements of Canadian women and girls. Dr. Ratnam is the first Tamil Canadian women to receive this honour. This year's WAGE theme, "Through Her Lens: Celebrating the Diversity of Women," acknowledges the contributions of eleven remarkable Canadian women from various backgrounds who are actively shaping the future and fostering inclusivity. Dr. Ratnam's journey is deeply rooted in Scarborough, where she was raised, continues to reside, and passionately dedicates her work. A proud graduate of the University of Toronto with a Ph.D. in neurobiology, her research focused on the regulation of inflammation by resident immune cells in the brain, known as microglia, following cerebral ischemia.

Dr. Ratnam serves as the President of the UTSC Alumni Association, committing her time to support activities that strengthen the alumni community and deepen their connections with the institution. Her

dedication to volunteerism was acknowledged in 2022 when she received the Arbor Award, the University of Toronto's highest honor for individuals exhibiting exceptional and sustained dedication to the institution.

Anklets two thousand years ago

Natrinai is a classical Tamil poetic work and traditionally the first of the eight anthologies called Ettuthokai in Sangam literature. It contains both personal (love) and public (war, and other relationships) categories of poems. This anthology called Natrinai consists of four hundred poems in all, mainly eight to thirteen lines each. It is believed to be in the late Sangam era which dates from 100 to 300. Common era.





The four hundred poems of Natrinai are credited to 175 ancient Tamil poets. It is interesting to note some of its lines were borrowed into later Tamil works of post Sangam knowingly or unknowingly.

This twelfth poem on the anthology titled Natrinai is composed by a poet named Kayamanar, in a setting as if a

friend of the heroine is expressing the scene to the hero at the time of eloping, and explaining the reason for the tearing of the heroine. Guess eloping is not new, it had happened two thousand years ago among the Tamils who lived in Tamil Nation too. In this incident not that the dame is too enthusiastic about the whole episode for she will miss her past life. Indeed, it would be a very painful experience for the dame. Memories will linger for a long time, and she will miss her friends. Indeed, she was tearing. Let us see how the friend unfolds the situation in this poem written two thousand years ago.

The heroine's friend describes the time and venue when the elope took place. It was very early in the morning. Everyone in the neighbourhood was asleep, and the heroine stealthily followed her lover who was waiting for her outside the house. While stealthily walking towards the door the sweet fragment smell of the wood apple draws her attention from the pot where it has been kept to ripe the previous day.

Had it been any other time she would have been the first to crack wood apple and taste the fruit, but the need to move on was so great she moved on with the mission of eloping. In the dawn hour she covers herself with a blanket walking out stealthily, and to avoid any chiming sound from the anklets she quietly bends down and removes the anklets on her feet.

She sneakily covers herself and tip toes. In order to avoid making a sound she had already removed both her anklets and left them on the ground. She leaves her two-beautiful line drawn balls which will not be touched ever in the future. It will be memorabilia for her friends to think of her.

Worthy men, who consider disgrace in others, as unbecoming as their own, are a lasting abode to sensitiveness to shame. Valluvar's idea is that any disgrace coming to others is as hateful to worthy men of virtue, as unbecoming conduct in themselves. Great men, who wish to influence and control the world, will plan their activities systematically, within the defensive bounds of sensitiveness to shame. Great fighters will not resort to any deed that will bring them shame.

Worthy men, who cherish sensitivity to shame, will rather lay down their life to defend honour,; they will never forgo their honour for the sake of life. Tholkappiyam clearly states that sensitiveness to shame is more



precious life. "Uyirinum siranthatu naane". If people are not ashamed of things, that others have reason to be ashamed of, righteousness will itself feel shame for them. If one breaks the rules of ethics he offends his own birth. When he acts dishonourably, he will be lost to virtue itself. The men who do not possess sensitiveness to shame in their personality, are like wooden dolls operated by strings.

Kaykeyi in Kambaramayanam was wooden hearted as Kamban describes-'maranthaan ennum nenjinarl, naanarl'. When one acts against the dictates of honour, he is lost to virtue itself. Naaladiyar asserts that the righteous never do harm to others through fear of shame and disgrace. Since death is only a one-time suffering, they live uprightly to avoid shame or challenge to their dignity.

The Harmful Effects of

Nowadays men aged 18-34 are becoming addicted to the habit of visiting pornographic websites. A moment of curiosity turns into fascination. A momentary diversion becomes a habit that recurs over months and years. Every month, 70 percent of men aged 18-34 visit websites dedicated to pornography, which make up 1 per cent of internet itself. It is not just a problem for men; roughly 17% of women are addicted to porn. And 90% of children aged 8-16 have seen some-in fact, boys aged 1-17 are porn's most frequent consumers. With every second that passes by, 30,000 people are viewing porn, and roughly \$185,000/- is spent on porn every minute—leading to at least \$10 billion spent on porn each year. This unravels a threatening lifestyle of lust unheard of in the past.

Pornography a healthy crisis.

Pornography has been called 'The Public Health Crisis of the Digital Age'. It affects the brain exactly in the same way that illicit drugs do. When a person views pornographic material, the brain is over-exposed to pleasure chemicals like dopamine, serotonin. oxytocin, and epinephrine The brain rewires itself to accommodate the extra chemicals, building up first a tolerance and then a dependency, first wanting the pleasure chemicals and then 'needing' them. Pornography is a drug epidemicand it has taken the world by silent storm. Pornographic websites show naked photos of men and women engaged in various kinds of sex-activities. They display fake naked photos of film stars and serial artistes. They encourage them to engage in chat sessions and also arrange sex sessions especially with elderly women offering free sex. They give a warning that they should not be viewed by those under the age of 21 but there is no way of preventing young ones of prying into them.

Pornography- a perverted selfexpression.

Just like with any other addictions, thousands brazenly profit from its victims. To protect their multi-billion-dollar industry, pushers of this perverted 'selfexpression' unabashedly fight attempts to

curb illicit material, no matter how vulgar or debasing it may be. Media portray it as harmless fun. Some misguided counselors even encourage couples to watch porn to solve matrimonial problems- a tragically destructive mistake.

It's Devastating Effects:

Some will argue that looking at a few erotic images is no big deal-'a victimless crime'. But what about the people-mostly women-who sell themselves, or are sold, to fuel the porn industry. And what about the addicts themselves? Are they really satisfied by the habit that chains them to a cycle of uncontrolled lust by a spiral of self-loathing. The increasing number of sex related violence in many countries can be attributed to pornography. Young women are forcefully intimidated to engage in sex. -sometimes provoking murders and many undesirable incidents providing a major threat to civilized living. Sometimes women are way-laid and sexually assaulted by sexhungry, lustful men roaming like predators. Growing body of research shows the devastating effects of pornography on those who fall under its spell: increased chances of depression, feelings of loneliness, difficulty establishing and developing relationships, loss of jobs, financial difficulty, marital infidelity, and divorce. Perhaps, the most surprising effect of porn is that it causes addicts to enjoy or even engage in real sexual intimacy. One study found that frequent pornography consumption was significantly related to greater depression, anxiety and stress as well as poorer social functioning. People addicted to pornography really found it difficult to have normal sexual relationships with their partners when they get married. I know of a guy who took very long time to get adjusted to married life that he had to resort to a life of separation from his wife leading to divorce. Researchers in Columbia University found a link between compulsive pornography consumption, and poorer mental health, low self-esteem, and poor attachment in relationship.

Sex-based Crimes:

Sex based crimes are on the increase in recent times. The Toronto city council declared gender-based crimes and initiated pattern of violence as an epidemic last Thursday. -the same day a man was

arrested for alleged drugged and sexually assaulting an 'underhoused 'woman. The declaration was part of a matter to matter from Mayor Chow that passed with no opposition and calls on the provincial and federal governments to make the same move, just after Ontario declined to do so. The city's declaration came as a 54-yearold man was charged with sexual assault and administer drug to overcome resistance after approaching a woman near the intersection of Dufferin and Bloor Street west. Police said the man offered to drive her to his where he allegedly gave some food and drinks that contained obnoxious substance before he sexually assaulted her. Experts and advocates in the sector say that the move is a step in the right direction to ensure women are protected from gender-based and intimate-partner violence-especially those who are unhoused. Advocates have said the declaration of an epidemic, while largely symbolic, uses a public health framework to help survivors and ring attention to the issue as a sociological phenomenon. Mayor Olivia Chow said," We need to give hope to women and children that are experiencing violence now and give them hope to say that they can recover". According to statistics Canada, 90 homicide victims were killed in 2021 by an intimate partner-three quarters are --up from 84 victims in 2020 and 17 victims in 2019.-women and girls.

The Panacea:

It is the cumulative effect of pornography that has led to these acts of violence in the modern world. Sex appeal is the major factor that has evolved a sex-starved society. Advertisers exploit the sex instincts of depraved men who resort to violence to give vent to their feelings. The internet is polluted with websites that exhibit sex scenes that can provide the incentive to encourage men and women to crave for sex indulgences. People who produce fashionable garments give top priority to sex-appeal and hence pornography has become the order of the day. Social media is encouraging pornographic consumption that has made it the curse of modern lifestyle. It is an epidemic that has to be controlled by the united effort of all facets of governmentfederal, provincial and municipal to make the nation free from these hazards.


Lastly, I agree that kids should be required to do household tasks because

ATTOSECOND PHYSICS WON THE NOBEL PRIZE IN 2023

Experiments With Light Capture the Shortest of Moments




The most coveted announcement of the year for the world of Physics has been made. The Nobel Prize for Physics was awarded to a trio of experts for their pioneering work on tiny electrons whose ultra-rapid movements were earlier thought impossible to track. All matter comprises atoms, and an electron is its smallest unit. The number of electrons in a pinch and their configuration depends on which element we discuss. For example, a Hydrogen atom has just one electron, a Helium atom has two electrons, and an Oxygen atom has eight electrons.

The 2023 Nobel Prize laureates in physics are being recognized for their experiments, which have given humanity new tools for exploring the world of electrons inside atoms and molecules. Pierre Agostini, Ferenc Krausz, and Anne L'Huillier have demonstrated a way to create extremely short pulses of light that can be used to measure the rapid processes in which electrons move or change energy.

The Process

"The laureates' contributions have enabled the investigation of processes that are so rapid they were previously impossible to follow," an official readout said. What exactly is the process that won the 2023



Nobel Prize for Physics? The Nobel Prize in physics has been awarded for looking at electrons in atoms during the incredibly tiniest of split seconds. The question arises: how small are these split seconds? To understand how tiny they are, consider the following.

One heartbeat conventionally occurs in one second. A tiny hummingbird can beat its wings 80 times per second. We can only observe this as a whirring sound and blurred movement. Rapid movements blur together for the human senses, and concise events are impossible to watch. We need to slow it down by using tricks from an advanced camera to observe these brief instances. "The same principle applies to all the methods used to measure or depict rapid processes; any measurement must be done more quickly than it takes for the system being studied to undergo a noticeable change. Otherwise, the result is vague. This year's laureates have conducted

experiments demonstrating a method for producing pulses of light that are brief enough to capture images of processes inside atoms and molecules," an official readout by the 2023 Nobel Committee said.


Attosecond **Physics**


A glimpse into Attosecond Physics unraveled by dis year's Nobel Laureates. Atoms' natural time scale is incredibly short. In a molecule, atoms can move and turn in millionths of a billionth of a second, not as femtoseconds. But when electrons move inside atoms or molecules, they do it so quickly that changes are blurred out even in a femtosecond. "In the world of electrons, positions, and energies change at speeds of between one and a few hundred attoseconds, where an attosecond is one billionth of a billionth of a second," the Nobel Prize Committee said.


An attosecond is so short that the number of them in one second is the same as the number of seconds that have elapsed since the universe came into existence 13.8 billion years ago, it added. "On a more experiments that opened the new research field of attosecond physics," the Nobel Prize Committee added.

Movement of Electron

The trio of scientists in different countries conducted experiments that demonstrated that attosecond pulses could be observed and measured. "Now that the attosecond world has become accessible, these short bursts of light can be used to study the movements of electrons. It is now possible to produce pulses down to just a few dozen attoseconds, and dis technology is always










Laser light interacts with atoms in a gas

So far, it was possible to observe atomic processes during the durational period of a femtosecond, nothing beyond that. "Improving existing technology was not enough to see processes occurring on the amazingly brief timescales of electrons: something new was required. This year's laureates conducted

Applications

Attosecond physics allows us to understand the intricate mechanisms governed by these subatomic particles. This breakthrough marks a significant step in understanding the smallest particles in the universe, promising a brighter future filled with groundbreaking innovations. The Attosecond pulses can be used to test the internal processes of matter and to identify different events. According to the Nobel Prize Committee, these pulses have been used to explore the detailed physics of atoms and molecules, and they have potential applications in areas from electronics to medicine.

For example, attosecond pulses can be used to push molecules, which emit a measurable signal. The official Nobel Committee readout said that the signal from the molecules has a unique structure, a type of fingerprint that reveals what molecule it is, and the possible applications of this include medical diagnostics as well.

The foundation stone laying Mahavidyalayam Science Lab Building was held today, Friday November 10th, 2023, at Dehiowita, Kegalle district, Sri Lanka. Honorable Mano Ganesan, Leader of Tamil Progressive Alliance and Member of Sri Lankan Parliament, Thushyanthan R. Thurairatnam, Canadian Tamil Congress (CTC) Humanitarian Projects Coordinator for Sri Lanka, the Principal, Teachers, Parents and Students of Dehiowita Tamil Mahavidyalayam participated in this ceremony.

Tamil Canadian Walk hosted by the CTC on September 10th, 2023, raised funds to build the ground floor of this school building which will house the Science lab. The Dehiowita Tamil Mahavidyalayam was severely impacted by landslides, and it was declared unsafe. The Sri Lankan government has

allocated a safe land about 1 kilometer away from the original school location to move this school. The project budget is little over \$100,000 to construct the building and furnish the classrooms and equip the labs. \$70,000 has been raised through the Tamil Canadian Walk 2023 and CTC is continuing to coordinate this fundraising effort to achieve the fundraising target to complete this project, The ground floor building construction is expected to conclude in February 2024.

Dehiowita Tamil Mahavidyalayam has students studying from grade 5 to grade 13 and has about 600 upcountry Tamil students. This school only has the Arts stream for GCE Advanced Level (A/L) and doesn't have a science stream, due to the lack of science lab facility in this school. The Tamil students successfully completing GCE O/L examination in this school and wanting to study Science are

either forced to move to another area school far away from home or forced to pursue their studies in the Arts stream.

2023 is the 200-year anniversary of upcountry (malaiyaha) Tamils being brought from India to Sri Lanka by the British as laborer's and CTC committed its support through its annual Tamil Canadian Walk for the Upcountry Tamils in their most critical need which is Education.

Mississauga ready to be an **Independent City**

18 TH YEAR IN CIRCULATION



November 15, 2023

Moday, Mississauga City Manager and ▲ Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) Shari Lichterman presented an update to Council about the City of Mississauga becoming an independent, single-tier municipality on January 1, 2025.

In June 2023, the provincial government passed Bill 112, Hazel McCallion Act (Peel Dissolution), 2023. This legislation dissolves Peel Region as a governing body and makes Mississauga an independent city.

"We've advocated for this change for years and are prepared to take on the challenge of becoming a single-tier, independent municipality. The City has proven its ability to be a world-class destination with strong financial management, exceptional leadership and extensive experience," said Chris Fonseca, Acting Mayor and Ward 3 Councillor. "The shift towards independence will allow Council and the City to make meaningful decisions to address key issues unique to Mississauga such as housing, growth, transportation, infrastructure, climate change and financial management. We're confident this change will lead to a better service delivery for residents and businesses. This is good news for Mississauga."

At present, the City of Mississauga splits its property taxes. Of every dollar collected from property tax, around 36 per cent stays with the City, while almost half (45 per cent) goes to the Peel Region. This money is used to help pay for services such as police, housing supports, roads, water and wastewater treatment and waste management, among others. Under the current structure, Mississauga pays 60 per cent of the regional tax levy. Through independence, the majority of property tax revenues will now remain in Mississauga and the City will be able to make investments in its strategic priorities without interference.

"Moving to a single-tier government structure will provide residents and taxpayers with cost savings and more coordinated service delivery," said Shari Lichterman, City Manager and Chief Administrative Officer. "We will have the ability to make decisions independently and that means we can do things like approving housing more quickly to reach our provincial housing targets and deliver improved programs and services that meet the direct needs of those in our Mississauga community."

The City remains committed to providing exceptional customer service to residents and businesses and funding programs efficiently and effectively. Transferring regional services to the City will eliminate duplication of services and create efficiencies while providing the necessary support to iront-line service areas. Residents and businesses will also have a single point of contact for all municipal services.

To get ready for independence, Mississauga has taken action to bring on the right people with the right experience to ensure the city is ready to take on regional services. This includes hiring Catherine Matheson as the Interim Commissioner of Health and Human Services and appointing Lori Kelly, former Director of Human Resources, as the new Director of Municipal Transition and Integration.

Lichterman added, "We're ensuring Mississauga will have the right people in place for a seamless transition. This includes bringing on experts in fields like health and human services so that we're ready to deliver these critical services on day one. Our focus remains on providing quality services with no disruption for residents

and businesses. It also means welcoming the highly qualified Peel Region staff and their expertise to deliver the programs and services in these areas." Mississauga is working closely in collaboration with the Government of Ontario, the provinciallyappointed Transition Board, Peel Region, Brampton and Caledon to ensure that all matters are handled fairly and equitably. The recommendations and decisions will be shared with the province for their final

We Love you Pata forever

The number of close friends, cousins, and colleagues Pata had throughout his life was as vast as a small country. He would often mention someone he talked to and say to me, "this, you know, is one of my dearest friends." And I would respond, "another one?" But to them, he was their good, best, or long-term friend of many years, Siva. All his friends would share with me how they were impressed by his work ethic and brilliance. Even into his 80s, he took on new projects and continued to support

His relationship with her remained strong even after Ammama's passing. He continued to call her weekly, a tradition he started when Ammama was still alive, saying, "it's because it's what Ammama would do."

Dr. Rachel Navaneelan was his other sisterin-law, lovingly known as "bubby." Pata often spoke about taking her to the bookstore and protecting her while she studied for exams. He was immensely proud of her accomplishments, confidently predicting that she would either

> Pata had warm relationships with his brother-inincluding the laws, Neelan, late the late Choutey, the late Kitchen, and Kundo uncle. These relationships were characterized by endless stories, weekly phone calls, paternal advice, and the recurring question, "Athan, can I get you another glass of wine?" followed by a disapproving look from Ammama.

> In his later years, found great joy in his nieces and nephews, celebrating their achievements, career successes, relationships, and family milestones. His nephews and nieces, including Ashok, Sharmini, Patiyah, Kunchan, Tony, Tanya, Shankaran, Sahu, and Havishmi, brought him immense happiness.

He was present for significant family events, such as the birth of Shankaran's daughter Arya and Tony's marriage to his long-term partner, Josh.

Sivakumar, his son-in-law, was more than just that; he was Pata's son. They shared daily chats about politics and news, and Pata appreciated the delicious fruit salad Sivakumar made for him. He considered Sivakumar an exemplary father and husband and appreciated his unwavering support and willingness to help. Pata often expressed his gratitude for Sivakumar, considering him a blessing to the family.

Pata's grandson, my brother Harikesh, meant the world to him. Pata often said that Harikesh was his vision, with each eye representing my brother and me. He was impressed by Harikesh's knowledge and assistance with technology. Pata fondly referred to him as "the miracle," admiring his pure and kind-hearted nature.

Pata had one child, but he believed that

was all he needed. His daughter, my mother Premilla, was his pride. She cared for Pata with immense dedication, especially after Ammama's passing. Pata often told his friends that no one could care for him as well as his daughter did. He admired her hard work and independence, recognizing that she achieved her success on her own. His love for her was boundless, and it will endure, as the love between a father and daughter is unique.

I remember when I wrote my Ammama's Eulogy not too long ago, my main goal was to focus on her family and how much they meant to her because she wasn't one to seek the spotlight. With Pata, it was a different story. He loved to share his accomplishments and stories. He enjoyed reminding everyone that he was a media man and that he once shook hands with Justin Trudeau. However, when he spoke about his achievements, he did so with humility and grace, inspiring others to listen a little longer.

Pata was an accomplished journalist and editor who composed and published many remarkable articles. But his influence extended beyond journalism. He became the local career center, helping friends and family find employment. Whenever someone needed a job, he would confidently say, "Don't worry, let me make a call, and I'll get you a job." He even considered himself a matchmaker, with many turning to him to find suitable matches for their children. And, of course, he was a promoter, endorsing various businesses in his community. Pata's repetition was a key strategy: he encouraged you to keep visiting the places he recommended until you gave in. He wasn't just a great media man but also someone always ready to lend a helping hand, a testament to his lifelong priorities. I believe that, in one way or another, big or small, recent or distant, he has touched the lives of everyone he ever knew.

Ammama was Pata's true love and life partner. They didn't display traditional affection but had a unique bond characterized by endless teasing and bickering. When Pata spoke about Ammama in an adoring way, it would annoy her, but he relished that reaction because it was quintessentially Ammama. Where Ammama was loud, Pata was soft; where she was assertive, he was passive. Her strength came from her husband, and his words were a great source of comfort. They had two pieces of advice for newlyweds: marriage is built on a give-and-take policy and requires patience. Ammama's patience lasted long, and she gave Pata to be with us for the past eight months. However, they couldn't bear to be apart any longer, and now they are eternally reunited, as their love and bond remained unbroken.

My Pata, Patikins, my Boo. I've never been one to express affection openly or wear my emotions on my sleeve, but with you, I couldn't resist showering you with hugs, kisses, and heartfelt expressions of love. You were more than just my grandfather; you were like a second father to me. You protected me, provided guidance, embraced me, and supported me throughout my entire life. Everyone who knew me was familiar with you because I often spoke about you, emphasizing your paramount importance in my life. Even my friends know you as the legendary 'Pata.' Many of them are here today,



the paper. He was the most honest and soft-spoken man they knew. No matter the topic, he could always relate it to a captivating story. Not only were Pata's cousins close to him, but Ammama's cousins also became his dear friends. When we review the life and times of Late Mr. Siva Sivapragasam, who passed away peacefully in Toronto at the ripe age of 86.

Sivapragasam, popularly known as Siva had a Royal beginning since he had the great privilege of having his education at the reputed Secondary school in Colombo, Royal College.

He continued his higher education at the prestigious University of Ceylon, Peradeniya Campus, since there was great harmony among all the groups of people in the island. Meanwhile Virakesari newspaper had several vacancies and Siva was appointed as circulation manager. It was at Virakesari that Siva was able to develop his special talents. Since he had a very good interpersonal skills, he was able to get develop a good relationship with the rest of the staff members, which in term lead to great productivity.

While serving at Virakesari, he made a number of great changes. He was the one who was responsible for bringing out a new daily newspaper called "Mithiran" which turned out to be an instant success. Soon after he was able to bring out a special edition of Virakesari for the readers in plantation sector.

Since, Siva wanted to promote the special talents of the writers from upcountry areas of Sri Lanka, he created Virakesari Publication to publish north and short story books authored by writers from Upcountry.

After serving Virakesari for nearby three decades, he moved to Canada to join the family of his only daughter Premilla.

Within a week of arriving in Canada, Siva was offered a position of Manager for a Tamils Business directory that was being published by late Mr. Nandakumar, a very talented architect.

Siva effectively managed publication for nearly four years until the business was folded up by its owner.

Just as he was about to rest Mr. Siva was called upon to be executive editor and marketing consultant of a Tamil Canadian managing newspaper "Monsoon Journal". It soon turned out to be a very successful monthly and it continued for the next 18 years. While managing the publication of Monsoon Journal, Siva had a brain wave of a Canadian edition of Virakesari newspaper which was very effectively published for some time.


Mr. Siva was also involved in the annual publication of Canadian Tamils' Chamber of Commerce, for nearly a decade.




Working together at the Chamber of Commerce not only enriched our own learning development and resulted in a close collegial bond, but also escalated to a more friendly and mutually respectful relationship.

Siva is remembered by his wisdom seven decades ago

y memories of T.
Sivapragasam go back to the late 1950s when we were both residents of Marrs Hall at the University of Ceylon, Peradeniya. By a coincidence, we also had another Siva: K. Sivapragasam. So, one was called T. Siva and the other was called K. Siva. Both were from Royal College, Colombo: a double distinction.

After graduation, where we both specialized in Economics, Siva and I crossed paths again, this time at Lake House, one of the major newspaper publishers in the country. I was a reporter on the editorial staff of the Observer and Siva was a reporter on the Daily News.


Siva's beat was politics and finance. He was regularly seen hanging out in the lobby of our parliament, chasing MPs and cabinet ministers, hunting for scoops and breaking stories.

Perhaps one of the legendary stories at the Daily News was an investigative piece he did on the shenanigans in the Bank of Ceylon. Our news editor, who rightly believed in the right of reply, asked Siva to contact the General Manager (GM) of the Bank, an

influential figure at that time, for his comments on the story.

When he spoke to the tightlipped GM, he told Siva to call him around 2 pm that afternoon for his comments. As agreed, Siva called him sharp at 2. The GM asked him "Do you have a pen and paper". When Siva said he did, the GM dictated to him: "When the Daily News contacted the General Manager of the Bank of Ceylon, he said, he had no comments to make"..

But that did not prevent the Daily News from running the story on Page one. In effect, it looked as if it was Siva who outsmarted the GM.


